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

The Three Faces of Thomas

n the Synoptic Gospels Thomas is only mentioned as one of the twelve; but in John's Gospel, Thomas' words are recorded on three different occasions. The first time is in Chapter 11 after the death of Lazarus and Jesus decided to go to Bethany, the village where Lazarus, Mary and Martha lived. Although the other disciples attempt to dissuade Jesus, Thomas says, "Let us also go, that we may die with him." At the last supper during the long discourse following the washing of the disciples feet Jesus begins to explain that he must leave to prepare a place for the disciples. "Thomas said to him, 'Lord we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?' Jesus said to him, 'I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." The third time Thomas speaks is the Sunday following the Resurrection of Jesus. Thomas was not present on Easter Sunday evening when Jesus appeared to the other disciples. When Thomas does return the rest tell him that Jesus appeared to them, but Thomas refuses to believe it and says to the others, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put m finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe." What follows seven days later is Jesus' confrontation of Thomas' lack of faith in what the other disciples told him. Although Thomas makes a profound pro-



fession of faith when he encounters the risen Lord, he will be remembered as "Doubting Thomas" in the earthly part of the Kingdom.

Thomas is far more complicated than to be known only as the doubter. He certainly did doubt, but he also demonstrates a sense of stoicism and practicality in his approach to faith in Christ. In the first episode Thomas is willing to suffer and die with Jesus. This stoic quality is incongruent with the man who doubts that Christ rose from the dead. In the second episode, Thomas is asking what appears to be genuine interest in following Jesus, but he is not clear about where Jesus is going. There are all sorts of arguments about Thomas' and the other disciples lack of faith and understanding; but he does ask the question. It is the third episode that forces Thomas to be remembered along with all the other nonbelievers. Let's face it; Thomas got a bum rap in John's Gospel. We don't remember Peter as "Peter the Denier", or the young man, sometimes known as Mark or John Mark, in Marks Gospel who followed the arrested Jesus, but ran away naked when the Temple guard grabbed his clothing. There is nothing about "Naked Mark". We could remember the rest as "Afraid Andrew, Cowardly Philip, Deserter James" and so on because the disciples deserted Jesus when he was arrested. The point is that we do not remember any of them by these monikers except for poor Thomas.

Perhaps I sympathize with Thomas because his reactions are so often mirrored by our reactions. I think there are times when we are stoical about things that we are getting ready to face or are going though. There are times when we stand up for our faith and what we believe and do not give even a second thought to what criticism might follow. There are times when it is important to ask questions about things that are not clear to us. Thomas was asking Jesus for direction; don't we do the same thing in our prayer life. Finally, is our faith so crystal clear that we never question the Scriptures, the Creeds, the teaching of the Church and the Church's direction about certain matters?

The revelation of God did not cease with the close of the Apostolic Age. God continues to teach, to disclose God's love and will throughout all the ages of humankind. Thomas' statement that gave him the nickname of "doubting" was answered in just seven days by a direct appearance of Jesus. Blessed are you who continue to hope and wait for answers all the while remaining faithful to our Lord Jesus Christ.

A blessed Eastertide to all of you.

TFH shares the compelling goals of these world organizations. Missouri, in the bread basket of America, has hunger problems, too, some in the inner cities, some in suburbs and smaller cities, and many in rural areas. TFH funds grant requests from Episcopal parishes throughout the diocese to support new and ongoing feeding ministries. Those TFH funded ministries we know include Trinity Food Pantry, St. John's Peace Meal project, and Good Shepard's Shepherd Farm in St. Louis County. Soon St. Francis' will learn during an Adult Forum of the many opportunities for helping the hungry in our diocese. I'll have information for us about a food stop that serves both hungry students and the visitors to a nearby drug clinic, just one of the many programs supported by our donations to the TFH.

Garden Talk

Spring's beauty is all around us and the flowering trees such as redbuds, serviceberry and dogwoods are awe-inspiring. Surely one of God's most beautiful and awesome creations is trees. They are important to us in so many ways, for shade on a sunny day, the beauty of a spring morning and perhaps in ways that we may not often consider; how important they are to other creatures such as insects and song birds.

The decline of Monarch butterflies has been publicized widely but the problem is much larger than one species. *National*



Geographic reports that 40 percent of insect species are in decline. Half of butterfly and moth species are in decline and 1/3 are threat-

ened with extinction. This problem is attributed to a number of causes, habitat changes, pesticides, climate change and invasive species; just to name a few.

What does this have to do with trees? Birds rely upon insects for food and insects are dependent upon trees. Caterpillars are a critical food source for over 96% of the songbirds. A pair of chickadees requires between 6000 and 9000 caterpillars to successfully raise a nest of young. According to Dr. Doug Tallamy, author of Bringing Nature Home, a native oak tree can support the caterpillars of over 500 species of butterflies and moths while a Ginkgo biloba supports one. Although a Ginkgo is a beautiful shade tree and is widely used in urban areas, it does very little for the other creatures in our environment. Native trees such as oaks, willows and hickories, do a much better job of supporting our fellow creatures.



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From the Bishop's Warden

As I sit down to write this, it's Good Friday. We just had Maundy Thursday service last night where we heard about Jesus' admonition that we love and serve one another. We heard how he washed his disciples feet to symbolize the reality of that need for service. Some of us had that lesson more indelibly imprinted on our psyches as we had our feet washed. Tonight at Good Friday service we will come face to face with Jesus' crucifixion and death. Having the benefit of hindsight we leave with the anticipation of celebrating his resurrection.

All these events of Holy Week speak of the remarkable love of God for us and the unimaginable gifts that God has given us and made possible through the death and resurrection of Jesus. We also rejoice in the wonderful gift of our new building. St. Francis is no longer a band of nomads but a parish with a "homeland" of it's own. That comes with a whole new set of responsibilities. Much of my effort this month has been chasing down various contractors and repair services to help iron out some of the wrinkles that we have encountered with the new building.

We have gotten the dishwasher working properly. The water inlet valve has a filter screen which was plugged with sediment, preventing it from filling. A sediment filter that was installed on the hot water heater will hopefully prevent future occurrences of this issue. We are also waiting for a new front control panel from the manufacturer which should prevent the hot steam from infiltrating the control display and associated electronics.

I am tracking down a new power supply for the light in the Children's room. The infernal buzzing of the electrical contactor for the outside lights will need a replacement coil to see if that will cure it's problem. Solid state relays may be the ultimate solution if this cannot be improved sufficiently. We are also working on identifying the issue preventing the door unlock feature from working on the Friends of St. Francis Day Care front door. There is a cracked glass in the front entrance way that was not due to any sort of impact. We need to speak to the installer about that.

So while it may not be real visible, there is a lot of behind the scenes activity required to be good stewards of the gift we have been given. All this maintenance work has resulted in a number of unanticipated expenses. So if you are looking for ways to express your thankfulness, providing some extra financial support to help offset a part of these expenses would be an excellent way to do it.
