
The First Sunday of Advent December 1, 2019

Lectionary Year A, Daily Office Year 2



Advent is a season of preparation and expectation in anticipation of the coming of our Lord Jesus on the Last Day. Jesus Christ is the One who came by Bethlehem's crib and Calvary's cross, who comes to us now in Word and Holy Eucharist, and is the One who will come in glory to raise us from the dead and give eternal life to all who believe in him.

THE SEASON OF ADVENT

The Church's liturgical year begins with a four Sunday season called Advent. The word "advent" comes from the Latin phrase ad venire, "to come". The word refers to both the coming of Christ in the flesh, which began the messianic age, and to his coming in glory, when he will bring his work of redemption to its completion in the resurrection of the dead.

Holy Eucharist Rite II at 8:00 & 10:15 A.M.

The Holy Eucharist, also known as the Holy Communion, the Mass, or the Lord's Supper, is the true Christian thanksgiving meal in which we remember and celebrate the life, death, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. It is the principal act of Christian worship on the Lord's Day.

Liturgical texts are from <u>The Book of Common Prayer</u> (BCP) & other liturgical sources.

Hymn selections are from <u>The Hymnal 1982</u> or other approved musical resources.




After the lighting of the Advent candle, the children are lead down the center aisle for Sunday School in the Children's Room. They will return during the Peace.







The Gospel

The Deacon reads the Gospel, first saying

The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Matthew. 24:36-44 **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

Jesus said to the disciples, "But about that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. For as the days of Noah were, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. For as in those days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark, and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so too will be the coming of the Son of Man. Then two will be in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. Two women will be grinding meal together; one will be taken and one will be left. Keep awake therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. But understand this: if the owner of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour."

Then the Celebrant continues:

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

Celebrant and People:

We remember his death, We proclaim his resurrection, We await his coming in glory;

The Celebrant continues:

And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with the Blessed Virgin Mary, St. Francis, Jeremiah the Prophet, and all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN**.




