


The Celebrant greets the People and they respond

The Collect/ Prayer of the Day

The Lessons

The First Reading *The Lector says* A reading from the Book of Genesis.

Genesis 22: 1-14

God tested Abraham. He said to him, "Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am." He said, "Take your son, your only son Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah, and offer him there as a burnt offering on one of the mountains that I shall show you." So Abraham rose early in the morning, saddled his donkey, and took two of his young men with him, and his son Isaac; he cut the wood for the burnt offering, and set out and went to the place in the distance that God had shown him. On the third day Abraham looked up and saw the place far away. Then Abraham said to his young men, "Stay here with the donkey; the boy and I will go over there; we will worship, and then we will come back to you." Abraham took the wood of the burnt offering and laid it on his son Isaac, and he himself carried the fire and the knife. So the two of them walked on together. Isaac said to his father Abraham, "Father!" And he said, "Here I am, my son." He said, "The fire and the wood are here, but where is the lamb for a burnt offering?" Abraham said, "God himself will provide the lamb for a burnt offering, my son." So the two of them walked on together. When they came to the place that God had shown him, Abraham built an altar there and laid the wood in order. He bound his son Isaac, and laid him on the altar, on top of the wood. Then Abraham reached out his hand and took the knife to kill his son. But the angel of the LORD called to him from heaven, and said, "Abraham, Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am." He said, "Do not lay your hand on the boy or do anything to him; for now I know that you fear God, since you have not withheld your son, your only son, from me." And Abraham looked up and saw a ram, caught in a thicket by its horns. Abraham went and took the ram and offered it up as a burnt offering instead of his son. So Abraham called that place "The LORD will provide"; as it is said to this day, "On the mount of the LORD it shall be provided."

The Second Reading

The Lector says A reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans


Romans 6:12-23

Do not let sin exercise dominion in your mortal bodies, to make you obey their passions. No longer present your members to sin as instruments of wickedness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and present your members to God as instruments of righteousness. For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace. What then? Should we sin because we are not under law but under grace? By no means! Do you not know that if you leads to righteousness? But thanks be to God that you, having once been slaves of sin, have become obedient from the heart to the form of teaching to which you were entrusted, and that you, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness. I am speaking in human terms because of your natural limitations. For just as you once presented your members as slaves to impurity and to greater and greater iniquity, so now present your members as slaves to righteousness for sanctification. When you were slaves of sin, you were free in regard to righteousness. So what advantage did you then get from the things of which you now are ashamed? The end of those things is death. But now that you have been freed from sin and enslaved to God, the advantage you get is sanctification. The end is eternal life. For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.



The Nicene Creed

All say together We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God. begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit

he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

We pray for the leaders of the Church, especially, Presiding Bishop Michael, Bishop Deon, Alfred our priest and Rebecca our deacon; for the people and ministry of St. Mark's Episcopal Church, and Mark their rector and Jerre their deacon; for Delengwa Parish in the Diocese of Lui, South Sudan, and Sylvia their priest; for the Deaconess Anne House interns, and those discerning a call to ordained ministry. (*Pause*) Lord, in your mercy, **Hear our prayer**.

Blessed are you, our God of compassion: for you hear the cries of the poor, you see the tears in the eyes of all who mourn, you feel the pain of those in anguish, and you come to the side of the lonely. Call your church to compassion and service. We pray for the ministry of the chaplains, staff, volunteers at Episcopal City Mission, and the youth in detention; for those affected either through illness or grief by COVID-19; and for those who struggle with addition. *(Pause)* Lord, in your mercy, **Hear our prayer.**

Blessed are you, our God of peace: for you have bid us to make warfare cease and to place your trust in you who bore us up on eagle's wings. Raise up among us peacemakers, and those who work for justice and peace by giving them courage, vision, and strength. We pray for members of our armed forces, especially Kyle serving in Iran, and first responders. *(Pause)* Lord, in your mercy, **Hear our prayer**.

Blessed are you, our God of justice: for you desire that all be one. Erase the prejudice and class divisions that plague our nation that together we might share in your vision of harmony. We pray for our elected officials that they may be filled with a desire to embrace truth and righteousness as they exercise their duties of office. *(Pause)* Lord, in your mercy, **Hear our prayer.**

Blessed are you, our God of strength: for you do not desire harm, but you favor our health. Give to your people the necessary measures of health, patience, and hope. We pray for Darla, Noel, and Jack; for Roger, Annie, Bill, Paul, Brenda, Sue, and the Broom-Morse family; for Kathy, Linda, and Jeremy. *(Pause)* Lord, in your mercy, **Hear our prayer.**

Blessed are you, our God of life and love: we pray to you for those we love but see no longer, especially the law enforcement officers who have died in the line of duty, and the youth in St. Louis whose lives were taken by gun violence. Let light perpetual shine upon them where sorrow and pain are no more, neither sighing, but life everlasting. Help us also, to remember that in both life and death we are ever surrounded by your love, *(pause);* Lord, in your mercy, **Hear our prayer.**

We invite you to take a moment and extend the peace of God to the members of your household and then to people in the world that you love and struggle to love.


The Spiritual Communion



The Celebrant says the Preface for Eastertide


It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth.

The Celebrant continues

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and told them to take and eat the bread for it is his Body given for all.

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and told them to drink for it is his Blood of the New Covenant shed for them and for many for the forgiveness of sins.

He told them to eat the bread and drink the cup for the remembrance of him.

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Almighty God, giver of life and destroyer of death, you have graciously reunited us as living members of your Son our Savior Jesus Christ and have hid us with him in you.



Genesis 22:1-14

This story is one of the most upsetting sagas of the Hebrew Bible to many believers.

- 1. What does it mean to offer the first fruits of our lives to God?
- 2. Why do you suppose God instructed Abraham to sacrifice Isaac?
- 3. In this story whose faith is being put to the test?
- 4. How does this story relate to The Lord's Prayer *lead us not into temptation*?
- 5. Read the Psalm 13. What is the connection here?
- 6. Is there a time in your life when you felt God was absent?

Romans 6:12-23

- 1. In last Sunday's sermon we heard that sin (idolatry) disguises itself in many ways in our modern culture. If St. Paul were around today what would he say enslaves our society?
- 2. How does obedience to God play a part in our everyday struggle to avoid sinful behavior?
- 3. How do you feel about being an obedient slave to God?

Matthew 10:40-42

The Gospel reading today finishes the discourse Jesus gives the disciples as he prepares to send them out (cf. 10:1-39).

- 1. What are your gifts, and how might you use them to spread the light of Christ?
- 2. What brings you great joy? How might God use that joy to spread the Gospel?
- 3. Where are the dark areas in your community that need the light of Christ?

Statue of St. Francis

Two large trees on the St. Francis property died last year and were cut down. The stump of the large oak tree on the corner of Howerton and Rockwood Arbor Drive was left at a height of about 12 feet so that we might have the option of a tree stump carving in the future.

The Bishop's Committee voted at the May BC meeting to ask for donations to have the tree stump carved into a likeness of St. Francis of Assisi. The proposal is to leave five feet of the tree as a base for the carving and then carve a seven-foot statue of St. Francis above that.

The estimate that we have received for this work is about \$2600. Currently, parishioners have committed donations of \$1800 for this effort. In order to proceed with this project, donations of an additional \$800 are needed. The tree carver only carves tree stumps between April and September so if we are to have the tree carved this year, we will need to get on his schedule very soon. If you would like to donate to this effort, please sent a check made out to St. Francis Episcopal Church and put "tree carving" on the memo line.
