The Second Sunday in Lent



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ABOUT WORSHIP IN THE SEASON OF LENT

Colors: We replace the green of Epiphany with purple and burlap. Purple is the color of humility, penance, and wisdom that comes from inward discernment. It is also the color of royalty. The extreme differences between the two (humility and royalty) express one of the great lessons of Lent: Christ as the servant-king and our attempt to be as such to the world as well. In penitential theology, purple is the color of inward reflection, which is one of the important things we are called to do each Lent in preparation for Easter. Burlap is a rough and simple cloth. It signifies the fasting, doing without, of Lent. (Attribution: https://doers.org/liturgical-colors-of-the-church/)

Seating: Our chairs are turned to face one another. This stark contrast from our usual forward facing chair arrangement wakes us up to Lent as a season different from all others. In Lent, we seek to turn to God more fully. We face one another to confess our need for God and the ways in which we have not loved God and our neighbors with our whole hearts.

Baptismal Font: The baptismal bowl is removed and Christ's cross replaces it. This serves as a reminder that "the spiritual grace of our baptism is union with Christ in his death and resurrection" (Book of Common Prayer, Catechism, p. 858).

Lectionary: The lectionary is an ordered system for reading the Holy Scriptures at the Eucharist. The Episcopal Church typically uses the Revised Common Lectionary, as do Roman Catholics, Lutherans and other denominations. This lenten season, with the encouragement of the Bishop and the full endorsement of St. Francis' Worship Committee, our readings come from *A Women's Lectionary for the Whole Church* by Wilda Gafney. Gafney writes that the aim of her lectionary is to "specifically and intentionally make women visible in the lectionary text. This will inevitably seem strange to some hearers or readers. Some will find it welcome and a signifier of inclusion. Some will find it discordant ... My language, like all language, is simply inadequate to express the fullness of God in and beyond the world or even in human creation." Music: As a season of fasting and quiet contemplation, our music is scaled back. We open in silent meditation and speak the parts of the mass–Holy, Great Amen and Lamb of God.

At St. Francis we say, "there are no mistakes in worship." If you sit or stand at a different time than others or sing off key, it is all pleasing to the God we worship. All we do and all we are is brought before God as an offering in our Eucharist.

Bell rings three times to initiate silence. Silence is kept for a time of prayerful reflection. Silence ends when the bell rings one time. Stand as the Presider enters.

A PENITENTIAL ORDER

Presider Bless the Lord who forgives all our sins.


- Presider Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

THE FIRST LESSON

Reader

A reading from Genesis.

3:1-7

Now the serpent had more naked intelligence than any other animals of the field that the Sovereign God had made. And it said to the woman, "Indeed, did God say, 'You two shall not eat from any tree in the garden'?" The woman said to the serpent, "From the fruit of any tree in the garden we may eat, though of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden God said, 'You two shall not eat and shall not touch it lest you two die.'" Then the serpent said to the woman, "You two will certainly not die, for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you two will be like God, knowing good and evil." A reading from the book of Ephesians.


2:4-10

THE NICENE CREED Stand

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. 

Through Abraham and Sarah you called us into covenant with you. You delivered us from slavery, sustained us in the wilderness, and raised up prophets to renew your promise of salvation. Then, in the fullness of time, you sent your eternal Word, made mortal flesh in Jesus. Born into the human family, and dwelling among us, he revealed your glory. Giving himself freely to death on the cross, he triumphed over evil, opening the way of freedom and life.

On the night before he died for us, our Savior Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his friends, and said: "Take, eat: This is my Body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins.

Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

	Bring us into the everlasting heritage of your daughters and sons, that with the Blessed Mary, St. Francis, and all your saints, past, present, and yet to come, we may praise your Name for ever.
	Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

Presider And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD

The Presider breaks the consecrated Bread. A period of silence is kept.

If you choose not to receive communion, please come forward and cross your arms over your heart to receive a blessing.

After all have received communion the Presider says


Let us pray.
