ABOUT WORSHIP ON MAUNDY THURSDAY

"Maundy" comes from the Latin word "mandatum" or commandment. At this unique Eucharist, we commemorate the new commandment that Jesus gives to his disciples to "love one another as I have loved you" (Jn. 13:34). We remember this through the Sacred Stories we tell and the ritual act of washing feet as Jesus did.

Maundy Thursday is the first of the triduum, which is Latin for "three days." These three days–Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter–are the most sacred days of the church calendar. Together, they form the heart of our Christian faith. As we did on Palm Sunday, we depart in silence because our worship does not end, but continues across the holy triduum.


Colors

We replace the purple and burlap of Lent with red. Red is the color of excitement, energy, power, and all things intense and passionate. As such, red is the color of the Holy Spirit . . . It is used on Palm Sunday and during Holy Week, recalling the work of the Holy Spirit through his Passion. (Attribution: https://doers.org/liturgical-colors-of-the-church/)

Seating

A portion of our chairs face the altar. This arrangement emphasizes the intimacy of our community of worshippers gathered at the Table of Thanksgiving. Similarly, the disciples gathered in their intimate community around a table for Passover with Jesus. Here, Jesus shared the bread and wine, his Body and Blood, and asked that we remember him each time we gather.

Just as Jesus and his friends shared a meal together on this night, so too, did St. Francis. Those who ate our Simple Supper at 6pm will process in from the dinner table singing the Gathering Hymn. Please stand and join with them as they enter.

THE LESSONS Sit

THE FIRST LESSON

Reader A reading from Exodus.

12:1-14

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the Lord. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the Lord. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt.

This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the Lord; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.

Silence will follow to allow reflection on the reading.

Presider sings the antiphon one time through and then the congregation joins in.

THE SECOND LESSON

Reader A reading from the first letter to the Corinthians.

11:23-26

I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

Hear what the Spirit is saying to the Churches.



THE GOSPEL

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

13:1-17, 31b-35

People Glory to you, O Lord.

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord--and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

"Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

THE FOOT WASHING

Following the introduction below, the Presider and Deacon will wash the feet of the first two people to come forward. Then those whose feet were washed will rise and wash the feet of the next people in line. This gives the entire congregation the opportunity to follow the example and command of Jesus to "love one another as I have loved you."

Presider

Fellow servants of our Lord Jesus Christ: On the night before his death, Jesus set an example for his disciples by washing their feet, an act of humble service. He taught that strength and growth in the life of the Realm of God come not by power, authority, or even miracle, but by such intimate service.

Therefore, I invite you who share in the priesthood of Christ, to come forward, that you may recall that we are Christ's servants as we follow his example, and remember his words, "if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet."

and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life.




Presider


Presider

And lead us not into temptation,


but deliver us from evil.

People Therefore let us keep the feast.



STRIPPING OF THE ALTAR

Each Maundy Thursday we lovingly remove everything from the sanctuary and altar. We strip the altar to bare wood. When everything is removed, what is left is nude and vulnerable. When we finish undressing the altar, we turn out the lights, and the congregation files out in silence.

As we participate in this ritual, we remember Jesus, who on the night of his betrayal laid aside his woven tunic and tied a towel around his waist. He stripped for service. Another Gospel tells us that later "they stripped him" for mockery and death. The altar stands for Jesus. The altar also stands for us . . . people who are being reduced in a hundred different ways—by illness, death, grief, betrayal, depression and economic reversal. Holy Week teaches us all a lesson in losing. We are not losers, but we have been reduced, some of us to what feels like our most bare and vulnerable self. Through the ritual progression of the triduum, we discover that even when everything has been taken away, something remains. We cannot arrive at resurrection without passing through loss, grief—our barest selves.

All are welcome to remain in the sanctuary for silent prayer.
