

## The Second Reading

4:13-5:1

Just as we have the same spirit of faith that is in accordance with scripture—"I believed, and so I spoke"—we also believe, and so we speak, because we know that the one who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus, and will bring us with you into his presence. ### The Nicene Creed







#### Celebrant:

The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread. A period of silence is kept.








Celebrant: The Gifts of God for the People of God.


