

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THE COMMON CUP RETURNS

Last Sunday, after more than two-and-a-half years without sharing one common chalice as a St. Francis community, we returned to sharing a common cup. This is a moment to rejoice.

The Bishop has offered new guidance for reception of the cup: some based on theology and some based on biology. Theologically, the Bishop has discontinued the use of small, single-serve cups in the diocese of Missouri. The Bishop writes, "The use of individual containers for the distribution of the consecrated wine was an intermediate step toward the restoration of the common cup." We use one cup because we are one Body in Christ. At St. Francis, we also receive from one loaf instead of receiving individual wafers. This is the theological reason for the return to one cup. For reasons of biology, the Bishop has expressly forbidden self-intinction (a congregant taking the bread and dipping it into the chalice). In an email to Laurie+, the Bishop said, forbidding self-intinction, "was a purely scientific decision. A recent study has reaffirmed that many hands in the chalice are a prescription for the spread of disease and pathogens. The fewer hands in the chalice the better. Either the Presider or the Chalice Bearer should hand sanitize and dip the consecrated host into the wine and place it in the hands of the communicant." THE LECTIONARY IN ORDINARY TIME

The Lectionary is an ordered system for reading the Holy Scriptures at the Eucharist. The Episcopal Church typically uses the Revised Common Lectionary, as do Roman Catholics, Lutherans and other denominations. There are three years—A, B and C—to the lectionary cycle. We are in Year C.

During the long green season after Pentecost, churches can choose one of two "tracks" (or strands) for the Hebrew Scripture (Old Testament) readings. Once a track is chosen, it should be used throughout the entire season.

The first track from Hebrew Scripture follows major stories and themes, read continuously from week to week. In Year C, we read from the later prophets. The second track of readings follows the Roman Catholic tradition of thematically pairing the Hebrew Scripture with the Gospel reading, often using a foretelling of Jesus Christ life and Ministry.

This Pentecost, St. Francis will use **track one** which follows the major and minor prophets Elijah, Elisha, Amos, Hosea, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Joel and Habbakuk.

BACKGROUND TO TODAY'S READING FROM HEBREW SCRIPTURE

The prophet Jeremiah lived to see the destruction of Jerusalem. Unknown writers composed this series of laments for the desolate city which tradition ascribed to Jeremiah. Regardless of authorship, the lamentations have moved Jewish and Christian believers alike with their poetry and image of God forgotten by the people and the people grieving their loss.

THE FIRST LESSON

Reader A reading from the Book of Jeremiah. These are the words of the letter that the prophet Jeremiah sent from Jerusalem to the remaining elders among the exiles, and to the priests, the prophets, and all the people,



THE SECOND LESSON

Reader A reading from the second letter to Timothy.

Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David-- that is my gospel, for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. The saying is sure:

If we have died with him, we will also live with him; if we endure, we will also reign with him; if we deny him, he will also deny us; if we are faithless, he remains faithful-for he cannot deny himself.

Remind them of this, and warn them before God that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth.

THE NICENE CREED Stand







People Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!


