

#### SEASON OF CREATION LITURGIES

St. Francis' is in the midst of a multi-year project to reclaim a portion of our land for native prairie habitat. Through the *Season of Creation* liturgies (September 7 - October 5, 2025), we will join our liturgical life to our Prairie Project.

#### What is a Season of Creation?

It is a time when we join with Christians around the world to celebrate in prayer and action our Gospel call to protect the Earth that God entrusted to our care. The celebration of this season began in 1989 when the Orthodox Church celebrated a Day of Prayer for Creation. From this, an ecumenical effort has grown to establish a worldwide Feast of Creation on September 1st.

# How is our liturgy tailored to the theme of Creation?

- Prayer about the gift of God's creation throughout liturgy
- Mass of Creation by Marty Haugen used each week
- Musical selections that highlight and reinforce the theme of creation

# Why is it important to mark a Season of Creation?

- Because our faith affirms that God in Christ loves, redeems, and sustains the whole of creation, not only human beings.
- Because of the urgency of climate change
- Because in the Episcopal Church we say "As we pray, so we believe."
  Our prayer transforms our thinking and our behavior.

# What is our Gospel call to grow in faith? What does Christianity have to do with ecology?

- God the Creator pronounced the world *very good* (Genesis 1:31) and gave humans the task to *till and keep the Earth* (Genesis 2:15) as stewards and caregivers rather than owners (Psalm 24:1).
- Destruction of nature is a sign of estrangement from God: hurt not the earth, neither the sea nor the trees (Revelations 7:3).

Christian hope is the renewal and restoration of all things. (Matthew 19:28; Acts 3:21) Our participation with God in creating a more just and habitable world and living more gently on Earth is how we share in what Archbishop Desmond Tutu calls the "supreme work" of Jesus Christ, who reconciles us to God, one another, and God's whole creation. The good news of God in Christ is for all creatures and the whole earth.

We give thanks to you for Jesus, who was baptized in the Jordan, tested in the wilderness, he traveled in fishing boats and told parables of farmers and seeds, laborers and wages, yeast and bread.

On the night before he died, Jesus took bread the work of field and hearth. He gave thanks, broke it and gave it to his friends saying: Take and eat, this is my body, given for you, do this to remember me.

Again after supper he took the cup of wine, fruit of the land, gave thanks and gave it to his friends saying: This is my blood, which is shed for you. When you do this, do it in memory of me.

Remembering Jesus' life, death and resurrection and  $\frac{1}{5}$ 


awaiting his coming kingdom, we offer you this bread and this cup.

Presider Alleluia! Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us.


People Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!

Our bread is gluten-, dairy-, and nut-friendly. This Eucharistic table does not belong to the Episcopal Church or to St. Francis'. This is God's table, and all are welcome. In the Episcopal Church, we receive both the bread and wine, the Body and Blood of Jesus. If you choose not to receive communion, please come forward and cross your arms over your heart to receive a blessing.
